The top two from each block were to go into semi-finals and a final. The blocks were almost completed when the very strong winds and storms in the afternoon meant that a number of players enjoyed the novelty of 'wet and windy play' - and the conditions enforced the re-scheduling of the semis and finals to Sunday afternoon, enjoyably watched by club members who had come for the normal Sunday play session. After some extremely close games the winner was Judith Pengelly, beating Eve Buckingham by 7/3, with George Lawson taking third place against Una Pengelly's fourth (7/6).

Wrest Park Doubles - Ten members had an enjoyable day at Wrest Park Doubles at the end of July. Leighton-Linslade came out on top with the final between the Pengellys and Martin Field and Sally Clay. The winners were Martin and Sally.

Grass Roots Final - Although we enjoyed the club round of this competition, which was reported on in the previous newsletter where 8 club members took part, the organisation from the Croquet Association in relation to the regional and national finals left a lot to be desired, with numerous changes almost up to the last minute. The result was that only one of our members was available to make the journey to Northampton - Norma Morris - who of course quite rightly, didn't feel like making the trip by herself - but we would express our thanks to Norma for putting up with the organisational chaos!

This competition is fairly expensive to enter and for little return - so the committee have decided that next year we will not be taking part in this competition. We intend to possibly organise a local competition for members without



a handicap and/or beginners.

Centre Stage Final - Richard Keighley writes -

Members will recall that Matthew Houseden was a worthy winner of our club event in June and he thus qualified for the National Final to be held at Northampton on 10th September. As runner up, I was expecting to ferry Matt to the venue with only a remote prospect of taking part. However, a few days before the event, I was phoned by the organiser to say that I had earned a wild card to the Final as she had balloted all the runners up and I had been the lucky one.

Ten of us took part in the Final. We were drawn into 2 blocks of 5 and Matt and I found ourselves in the same block. As luck would have it, it turned out that the winner of the game between us would qualify for the final stages and on this occasion it was me. I finished as runner up in our group with 3 wins and a +9 net hoop score. Matt was 3rd.

Playing on Lawn 3 at Pages Park with all its undulations had been good practice for the sloping lawns of Northampton. In the morning dew, the balls were describing significant arcs.

In my semi-final, I met John Bee, an Association player from Watford. We spent ages on the first hoop but I eventually won 7-4. In the Final, I played Derek Slow from Nottingham. He had beaten me in our Block game but I managed to turn the tables on him. My final shot was a jump shot which I am unlikely to be able to repeat. From an angle and about 4 feet from the hoop, I managed to land my ball on Derek's ball wedged in the hoop - it was a sort of Barnes Wallis bouncing bomb. My ball went



through leaving Derek's undisturbed. I was presented with the "EGG CUP", a sort of wooden pyramid with an egg cup on top. Why? It transpired that the competition had formerly been run by the English Guild of Croquet (EGC) before the Croquet Association took it over. **Club Doubles and Singles -** our Club tournaments traditionally bring the golf croquet season to an end of course, so on 30th September, 8 pairs contested the Doubles and they were split up into 2 blocks of 4 pairs with each pair playing all the others. Teamwork founded on married bliss led to George and Margaret Lawson and Len and Eve Buckingham winning their respective blocks, with cup holders Una and Judith Pengelly and John Cundell and Richard Keighley being runners up.

In the semi-finals, the Pengellys narrowly defeated the Lawsons 7-6 and the Buckinghams lost to John & Richard by 7 hoops to 4. In the Final, played just before a storm broke, John & Richard beat the Pengellys by 7 hoops to 5.

On 1st October, a record number of 18 members took part in the Singles competition.

3 blocks of 6 were drawn out. Judith Pengelly and Richard Keighley, the cup holder, both won all their 5 games to win their respective blocks and to qualify to play each other in one semi-final. In the 3rd block, John Cundell and Valerie Jeffers both won 4 games each and they were drawn to play each other in the 2nd semi-final. There were also very good performances from Joy Bown, Len Buckingham, Margaret Lawson, Una Pengelly and Tony Stammers, who all won 3 of their games.

Heavy rain interrupted the semi-finals but John and

Richard eventually emerged as winners. The Final was extremely close with the lead continually changing hands but Richard ran the extra hoop to win 7-6 and retain the trophy.

Competition Entry responsibility

On a number of occasions this year a few members have entered a particular event and then found that other social commitments have taken precedence, and they could not then play. who arrived at Pages Park anxiously clutching their piece of fruit and their vegetable which were the required entry fee for an afternoon of total madness.

Teams of two were selected by drawing cards and the participants were then handed a set of instructions which described the 'rules' for playing each hoop.

Sometimes hoops were played in the usual manner but many hoops involved special rules, substituting croquet balls for table tennis or golf balls for example. There were also some 'skills' challenges which required the players to show their ability to strike a ball in a particular way or along a straight line.

One of the hoops required players to change from their more normal 'missionary' position of addressing the ball and to use the Len Buckingham 'side-saddle' approach. It was interesting to see how difficult most participants actually found this.

If the number if players was small, their commitment and enthusiasm more than made up for it and there was much laughter and not a little in the way of disgraceful barracking and dubious play.

Probably the most difficult section was that involving

one partner of a team having to wear a blindfold whilst the other partner gave guidance and advice as to how and where to strike the ball. Some partners adopted a very 'hand-on' approach which would, had there been any present, undoubtedly have frightened any horses in Pages Park. Happily everything took place between consenting adults - some of who appeared to be rather enjoying the experience!

Ultimately there had to be some winners but three of the teams nearly ruined the afternoon by finishing first with equal scores. Our subs!

Martin Field has raised two points for discussion about the subs payable to belong to our Club. Decisions about subs are matters for the full membership at the AGM but what do you think about Martin's proposals:-

"The Junior membership fee should apply to anyone engaged in full time education up to the age of, say, 25 years. A substantially reduced membership fee should be charged for adults in full-time employment who would 'typically' be unable to play on weekdays, say £30.

I feel that both these measures would help attract/retain younger people and would be much more equitable for them."

Social Club

Len Buckingham would like to bring to members' attention the following facts that need to be considered in order that decisions can be made at the AGM concerning whether or not we include social activities during the close season in the form of last winter's events at the pavilion. So please consider the following proposals.

1. Our insurers will not charge any excess for insurance cover on almost all social activities for LLCC members.

2. Table Tennis is, however, not covered by our insurers as it is considerd to be a 'dangerous activity!' carrying an

excess of £85 per annum.

3. Visitors will be welcome and covered by our insurance.

4. We may wish to rename the club; e.g., Leighton Linslade Croquet and Social Club.

5. It is estimated that the hourly cost charged by the Council will be approximately $\pounds 2.30$ plus supply of tea and coffee.

6. To cover the hourly cost and the Table Tennis excess we need at least 10 persons at each session to pay £2.00 each - which would also give a little in hand for hidden costs/expansion of equipment.

7. It is suggested that the club would operate from November - April for 2006/7.

8. How much should we charge visitors - $\pounds 2.50$ per session or $\pounds 50$ for full membership plus the $\pounds 2.00$?

9. Do you want a Social Club?

10. If so - when? (Thursday mornings are not available).
